excited about something."



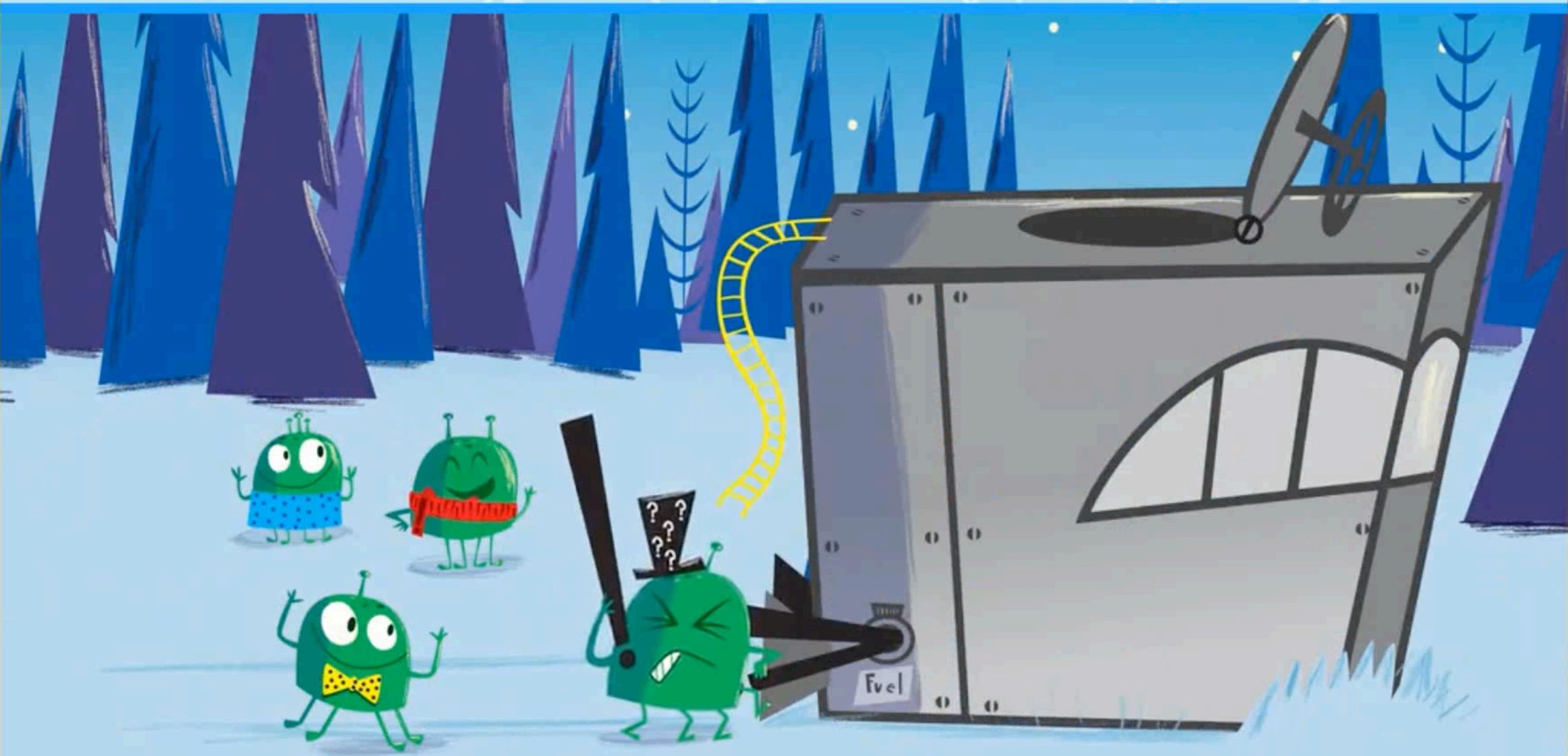
**“Oh—now I understand!”
